These services include portfolio management, financial planning and investment monitoring.</li> <li>For portfolio management clients, we manage individually tailored investment accounts and monitor those accounts on a continuous basis. These services are offered as part of your standard services.</li> <li>If you select discretionary portfolio management, we will accept discretionary authority to determine which securities and the amounts of securities that are to be bought or sold for your account(s) until you terminate this authority by notifying us in writing. You may impose reasonable limitations on this discretionary authority and change/amend these limitations as desired by notifying us in writing. We will exercise the discretionary authority you grant us any time we decide to change the holdings in your account in accordance with your outlined investment objectives. You make the ultimate decision regarding the purchase or sale of investment potions but will mostly invest client accounts in exchange traded funds, mutual funds, equity and fixed income securities. We may also, when appropriate, sub-advise certain portions of a client portfolio to independent third-party managers or recommend direct investment with independent third-party managers, typically when those managers demonstrate knowledge and expertise in a particular investment strategy.</li> <li>Although there are no required account size minimums or fee minimums, we do recommend an account size of \$2 million and above.</li> <li>When we provide investment advice to you regarding your retirement plan account or individual retirement account, our firm is a fiduciary within the meaning of Title I of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act and/or the Internal Revenue Code, as applicable. The annual fee charged by us generally ranges from 0.50% - 1.00% of the assets under management or advisement.</li> <li>Our fees for account monitoring services are negotiated separately with each client, are generally asset-based, and depend on the complexity of the client's situation and the services required.</li> <li>Portfolio management and monitoring fees are directly debited from client accounts quarterly in arrears at the end of each calendar quarter based upon the value (market value or fair market value in the absence of market value), of the client's account at the end of that quarter.</li> <li>Our financial planning fees are generally in the range of \$1,000 - \$10,000 per engagement, although some may be higher based on the amount of services provided. Fees are invoiced and can be directly debited from client advisory accounts upon authorization.</li> <li>At our sole discretion, we may charge additional fees, as negotiated with each client, for providing trustee services, administrative services and/or consulting services.</li> <li>Our fees are exclusive of brokerage commissions, transaction fees, and other related costs and expenses that you incur. You may incur charges imposed by custodians, brokers, and other third parties such as fees charged by managers, custodial fees, account maintenance fees, product-level fees, deferred sales charges, odd-lot differentials, transfer taxes, wire transfer and electronic fund fees, and other fees and taxes on brokerage accounts and securities transactions. At the same time, the way we make money creates some conflicts with your interests. You should understand and ask us about these conflicts because they can affect the investment advice we provide you. Here as some examples to help you understand what this means.</li> <li>The more assets there are in a client's advisory account, the more a retail investor will pay in fees, and our firm may therefore have an incentive to encourage the retail investor to increase the assets in his or her account or to engage in riskier investment techniques to increase the account size.</li> <li>If we recommend that a client roll over retirement plan assets into an account to be managed by us, such a recommendation creates a conflict of interest if we will earn an advisory fee on the rolled over assets. No client is under any obligation to rollover retirement plan assets to an account managed by us.</li> <li>The benefits we receive through participation in programs administered by custodians/brokers selected by you may depend upon the amount of transactions directed to, or amount of assets custodied and may benefit you or us exclusively.</li> <li>We pay referral fees to third parties for referring advisory clients to our firm.
